





INFORMATION FOR AVALON CAMPERS AND PARENTS

AVALON

opens Tuesday, June 28th and closes on Tuesday, August 23rd. The mid-season date is Tuesday, July 26th. We would like to ask that the first session campers plan on leaving before noon and that the second session campers arrive after 2:00 PM. Please read carefully the travel instructions attached.

CLOTHING & EQUIPMENT: It is necessary that every article of clothing and equipment

be marked with full name to avoid loss. Many girls' articles look alike
and by having a name this avoids upsets, disappointments and confusion.

Also please tape the enclosed list of articles packed on the inside
cover of the trunk. Girls should bring only the correct number of things
specified on the clothing list; there is not storage room for more. Only
trunks, duffel bags and suitcases are allowed and each should have the
girl's name on the outside where it is visible. Laundry will be sent
out weekly at the camper's expense. Please do not allow the girls to
bring "walkman" portable cassette or radio players as they disturb
cabin unity.

SAILING: All campers are required to wear life vests when sailing.

Please bring a comfortable Coast Guard Approved Type III Flotation Vest.

TENNIS: Please be sure that the tennis racket has proper weight and grip size for your daughter.

RIDING: All campers taking riding will be required to wear protective riding helmets and shoes with heels.

GOLF: All campers taking golf should have their own clubs. As a minimum the following are suggested: 1-#5 iron, 1 putter and 1 wood.

MEDICAL INFORMATION: All campers must have their doctor complete the medical examination form enclosed and return it to camp by June 15th. Parents please sign the Parents Authorization section and note the important Immunization notice. Our nurse and doctors need to have this information in order to give proper treatment to your daughter.

INSURANCE: All campers are covered by a limited insurance policy for doctor's bills, hospitalization and medication for minor accidents or minor illnesses taking place during the summer while at camp which are not chronic. The premium is paid by the camp.

FOOD: We find it necessary at the request of our counselors to ask parents and friends not to send "goodies" to camp. May we suggest if you want to have a treat for your daughter that you bring fruit and nutritious foods when you visit for her to share with her cabin friends. Please help us by not sending food - it only causes problems and will have to be returned to sender.

<u>VALUABLES:</u> The camp cannot be responsible for any money, valuable jewelry or personal equipment lost during the summer. We suggest inexpensive waterproof watches.

TELEPHONE: The camp has a camper telephone. Campers may receive calls only. We suggest you call at meal times - 8:00 to 8:30 AM, 12:00 to 1:00 PM or 5:30 to 6:30 PM as girls are near this telephone. The camper telephone number will be sent to you in June.

ALL CAMPERS: Laff and I are so looking forward to having you with us this summer.

Plans are well underway for a terrific time --- see you soon!!

In the beginning...

Mrs. Ruth Gilmore established Camp Avalon during the summer of 1929. Her husband's family owned the house across Crow's Pond with the big yellow awning. She and her children came to Chatham during the summers to camp out on the site which was to become Avalon. Many of her children's friends would come to visit during these summers and Avalon was born.

The early Avalon had only one building, a small section of the dining room, rec room and kitchen. The thirty or so campers wore blue wool bathing suits and on Sundays they wore white middy blouses with red scarves and blue bloomers.

Avalon did not begin as a sailing camp. Crafts was the most popular activity and took up most of the girls time. The big project of the summer was the making of cord hammocks. Occasionally hooks are still found in trees where some camper from the 30's must have sat working on her hammock.

Swimming (in those blue wool suits) was also very popular and was scheduled twice a day. The swimming pier was the only dock at the time. Since the 30's girls learned to swim off the same basic swimming pier. Tennis was also offered on a single clay court with wires located only at the ends.


Sailing was only a minor sport. Three "Blue Boats" which were 10 feet long with a jib and a mainsail were used, in addition to a 14 foot catboat called the "Bumblebee". The Bumblebee was known for its very heavy weather helm. Horseback riding was part of the program and, as always, the girls had to go by car to the riding ring.

Between 1929 and 1947 many cabins were added. Bird's Nest was the summer residence of Mrs. Gilmore (later renamed Crow's Nest). The Crafts Shop was a sleeping cabin called "Fox Forest" while a much smaller version of Sleepy Hollow and the Office were also used as cabins. Additionally, girls slept in tents which were located between the office and the DR.

The garage was located next to the single tennis court and was used for storage and as a workshop. A water tower located behind the DR served as the camp's water supply. Around the base of the tower was a trough with spigots that was used to wash hands and faces and brush teeth.

Editor's Note: On November 27, 1989 (only days before this history was printed), Betty received a package addressed to Director, Camp Avalon. Enclosed were a half dozen pictures of Avalon in 1945. The sender, Marge Doquette Shepherd, was not aware that camp had closed or that the book was being compiled! Mrs. Shepherd is the Director of Camp Winding Gap in North Carolina and found the pictures and thought the current Avalon people would be interested in seeing them! Many thanks Mrs. Shepherd.







The Wink and Bill Years....

In the fall of 1947 Gertrude "Wink" and Bill Winkler bought Camp Avalon. The Winklers had spent the previous four summer as co-directors at Camp Quanset on Little Pleasant Bay. Wink's sister and brother-in-law were the other directors. Many of the campers and counselors that first summer had come from Quanset to start a the new venture.

Swimming remained an important activity with the adoption of the American Red Cross swimming program. Tennis was expanded as two black asphalt courts were added and the clay court was up graded. The backboard was added as tennis became more and more popular. Archery, golf, waterskiing and drama were also added to the camp program.

The Avalon sailing fleet continued to grow during these years. Avalon went from three wooden Mercuries to five fiberglass Mercuries, five wooden turnabouts and several rowboats. A separate sailing dock was added.

Many new buildings were added between 1948 and 1969. Bird's Nest became Crow's Nest in 1961. Namequoit Cabin was added in 1948 and was changed to the infirmary in 1950. In 1949 Humpty Dumpty which was the garage with a screed in front area, Porthole, Barnacle and Starboard were added as sleeping cabins. Windswept was added in 1950. Sleepy Hollow, formerly a sleeping cabin, was made into a recreational building and the garage was moved to behind the kitchen in 1951.

Driftwood and Topsides were moved to Avalon in 1952 from a camp in Brewster, Mass. Spinnaker and the Store were added in 1953. Sou'Wester (1954), Mainsail (1960) and Mariner (1963) completed the sleeping cabins.

Amazingly the only camp phone during these years was on a party line with two other families!





The Betty and Laff Years 1970-1988

After 21 years as directors of Camp Avalon, the Winklers wanted to retire so their daughter, Betty, and her husband, George (Laff), came to Avalon in 1969 as co-directors with the Winklers for one summer.

In 1970 Betty and Laff became the directors of Camp Avalon. Laff had been waterfront director in the summer of 1961 while Betty cared for their two year old twin boys, Keith and Glenn. Betty was well prepared for a life in camping. She had attended Camp Quanset for ten summers as a child (receiving Quanset's highest sailing rank, Tioga Honors) and then attended Avalon as a CT, JC, counselor and head of sailing in the late 40's and early 50's.

Under Betty and Laff enrollment increased from 90 to 124 at its highest point with the addition of several new cabins. In 1973 Nor'Easter was added along with Hard-a-Lee in 1977. The DR was also enlarged in 1977 to accommodate all of the additional campers. Finally in 1979 the cook's quarters and CR were enlarged. The CR included a much bigger meeting area with its own shower room and bathroom.

Swimming remained popular and the swimming dock was enlarged so that campers no longer had to wade into the water through the razor clams! The diving board was also replaced with a slide on the new outside float.

The larger float was also needed as waterskiing became a more frequent activity.

The tennis courts were improved with a new Plexipave surface and new fencing. Searching behind the tennis courts for stray balls remained a necessary activity, however.

A trampoline was added in 1973 and was used extensively after classes. Gymnastics was added in 1976 with uneven bars, mats, etc. as gymnastics became more and more popular all around the country. Finally, the sporadically offered "Trim Limb" program was replaced with a much more exciting aerobics and dance program during the summers of 1987 and 1988.

INFORMATION ON TEACHING SAILING AT AVALON

Mercuries are <u>always</u> moored on the outside moorings ar' Turna. outs on the inside.

Care of boats and equipment, and the importance of having a boat in good condition should be stressed to each camper.

Campers should sail during the period -- Counselors should give instruction, but most important should explain and demonstrate. Counselors should inspire confidence, never get mad, nervous, etc. -- should allow campers to make moorings, get boat underway and everything from the beginning. They should be able to explain sailing well enough to do this.

Younger campers should be given responsibility, and campers in Topside should have equal instruction with campers in other cabins -- All campers should be taught on their own individual basis and not on their age grouping -- many of the younger girls have boats in their families and their families expect them to <u>learn</u> and be able to handle a boat. For the very young ones, the counselor can always hold the tiller and teach them other things but particularly to enjoy it and not be afraid.

Fear for all campers should be conquered by an explanation and demonstration of what actually happens. This is each counselor's responsibility.

During all sailing periods, campers should be supervised. Either a counselor in a boat, or if alone, someone on shore giving directions; such as, sailing short windward -- leeward courses, rounding buoys, making moorings, and such.

All campers, not just the good ones, should be pushed and worked with; counselors should not show favoritism -- should not sail with the same campers all the time. Counselors will be rotated to sail with most of the campers -- not the same ones all the time.

Each counselor should have a <u>watch</u> that she wears at all times. Classes start immediately on the hour. Boats should start into the moorings 10 minutes before the end of each period so that campers will

Turnabout Sailors

In 1981 the Avalon sailing ranks were changed slightly so that the Baybirds and two hour sailing classes could be integratated into the sailing program. The Junior campers continued to learn to sail in Turnabouts passing their Sailor rank. Apprentice Seaman was the equivalent of Turn Sailor in Mercuries and Baybirds. This additional rank allowed the new intermediate and senior campers to pass in one month. Seaman (Turn Skipper), Mate (Merc Crew) and Skipper (Merc Skipper) had the same basic requirements as their older counterparts. Additionally, the girls had to be able to handle a Baybird just as well as a Mercury. In heavy weather, the sailing program only had to slow down long enough to reef all of the Birds down to "hanky" sized mainsails.

With decreased competition during class time for Turnabouts, a very competent junior camp group sailed in their own AYC Turnabout Series each month. Each participating girl was able to sail in two or more races to qualify for the trophy.



STARTING AND FINISHING

The starting and finishing lines are between the white flag near the Race Committee Flag and the nearest buoy on the chart, excluding the Guide buoy of the pier.


The finish line shall be crossed in the direction from the previous mark unless otherwise specified by course boards.

The stanting mark is observed only at the stant unless posted as a mark of the course.

When the start and finish are at the pier, boats must pass outside the Guide buoy. Single handed boats shall fluish between the Guide buoy and the pier.

COURSE SIGNALS

Boards hung from the Pier or Committee Boat will entify marks (red), times around (black), and classes



(black) and, when needed, red (port), and green (star-board) to indicate the side on which marks are to be left,

All starting flags previous to your class will be dis-played whether or not there are starters unless the Race Committee makes a prior announcement of a change.

RULES

All races will be conducted in accord with the Yacht Racing Rules of the United States Yacht Racing Union, except as specifically modified or supplemented herein or by the Race Committee. The 720° rule will be followed:

"KE may dis Scoring of races is by low point system. Details are posted on bulletin board in the CYC Clubhouse. A club member MUST be on board each competition here.

A club memore acceptance with the Race Committee before each race.

If two boats hit, the Race Committee MUST be notified.

Yachts over at the start will be hailed by number.
All races have a two hour time limit.


PROTESTS






